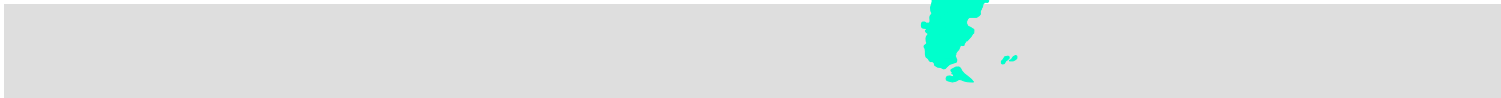
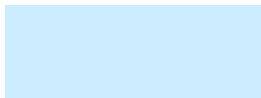

- Financial support of GFATM and World Bank have been essential for successful implementation of M&E structures at national and regional levels

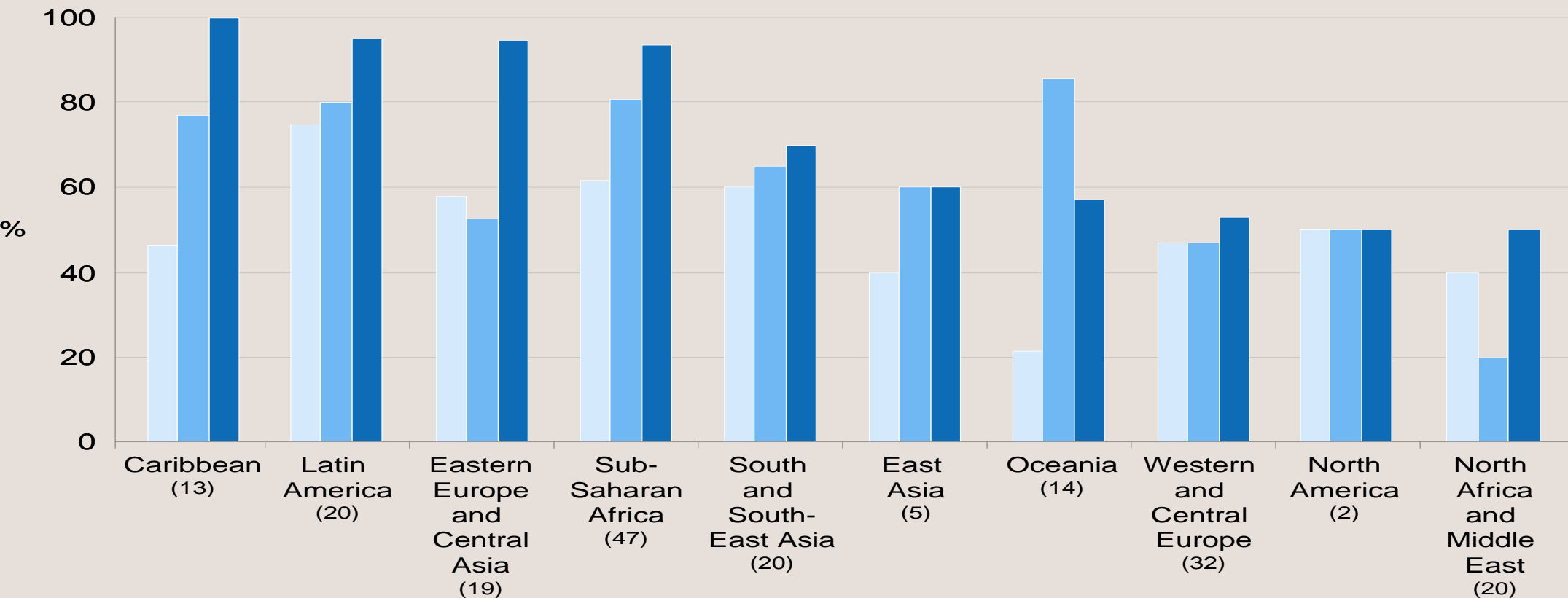
Response rates by region 2004–2008

Year of reporting (UN member states reporting/total number of UN member states)

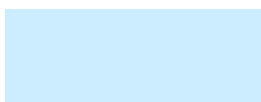

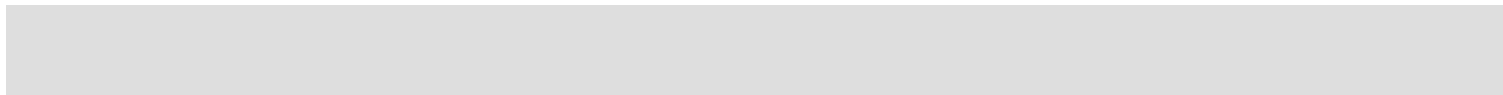

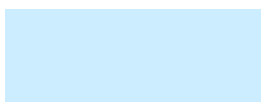

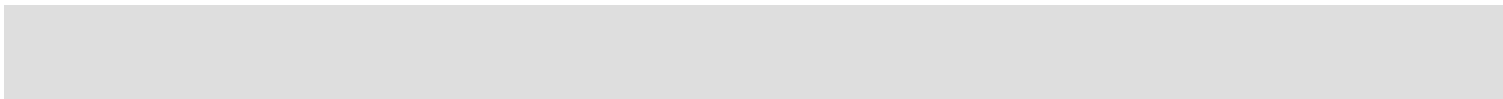
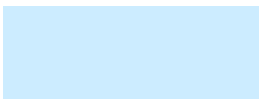

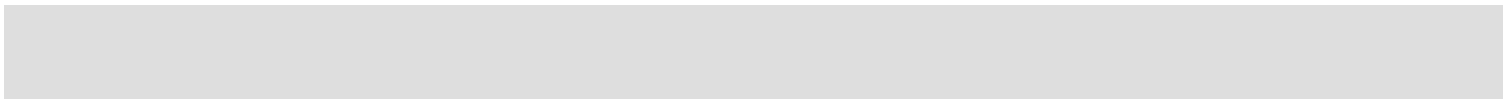

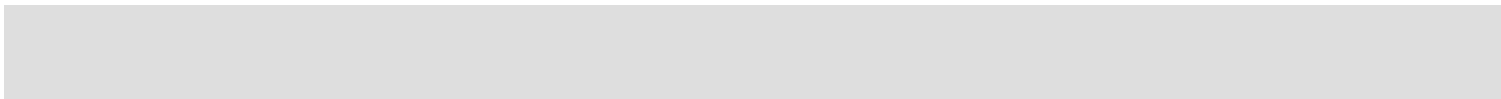

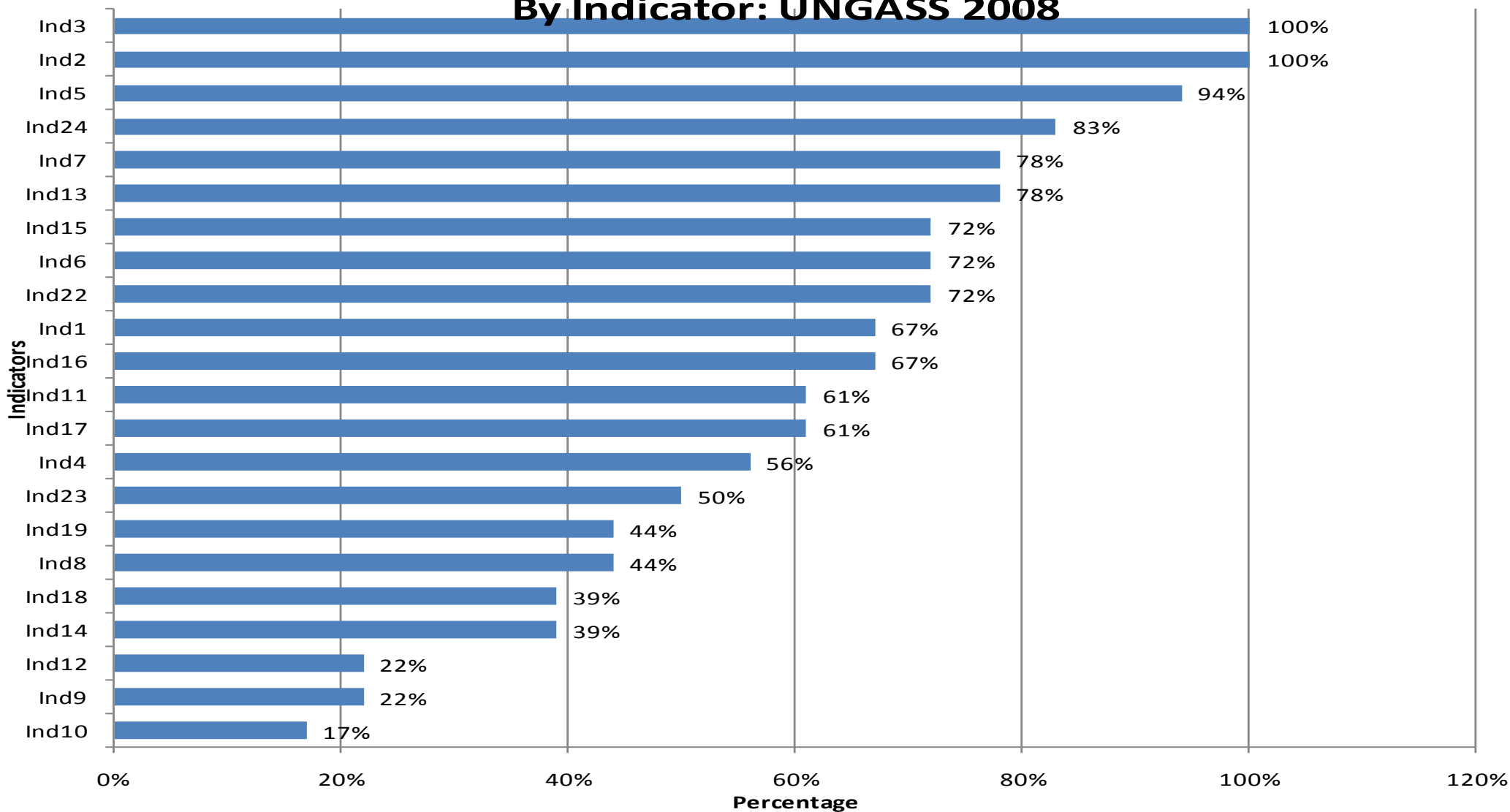
Percentage of Indicators Reported by Country: Larger Settings: UNGASS 2008

Percentage of Caribbean Countries and Territories Reporting By Indicator: UNGASS 2008

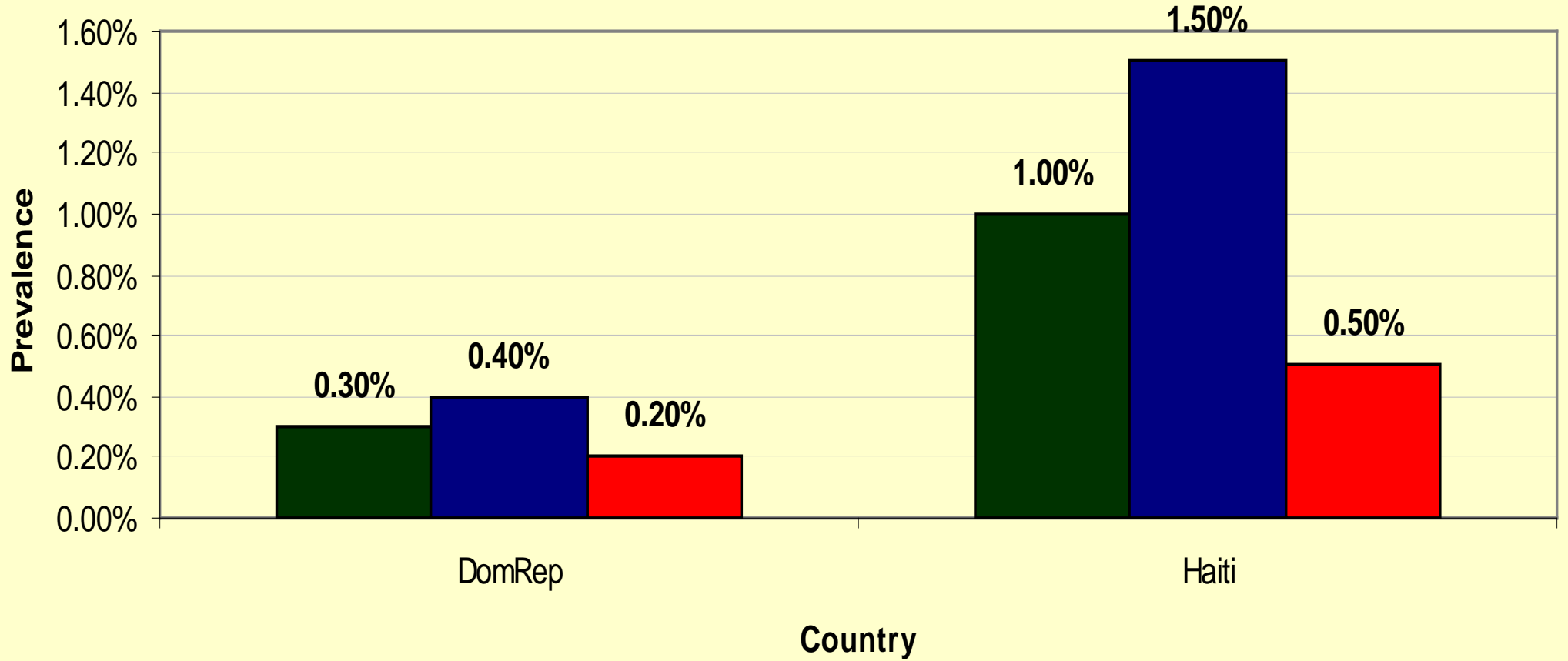


HIV Prevalence Among the 15-24 Years-Old in Dominican Republic and Haiti by Sex: DHS Results

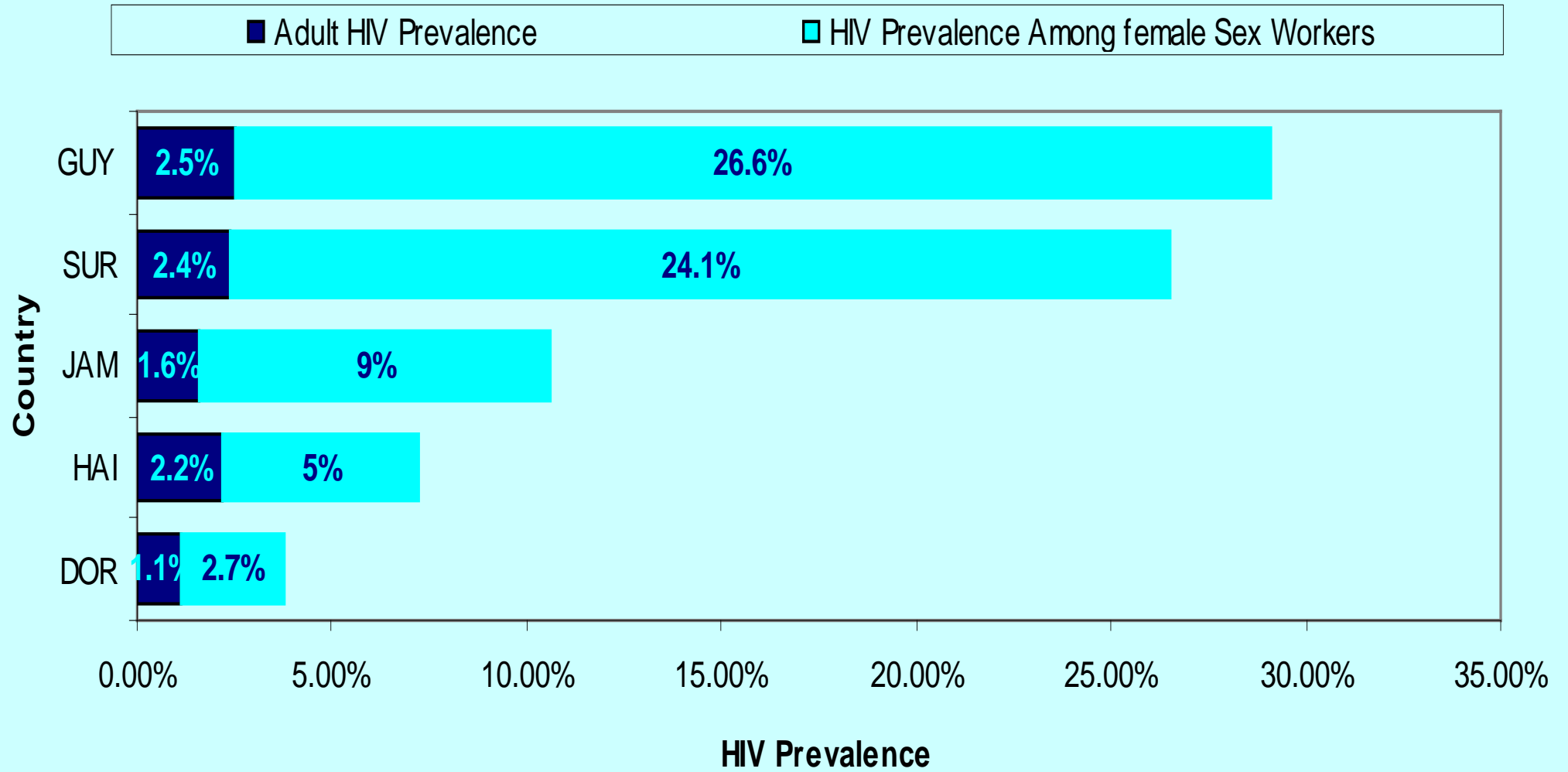

Comparing Adult HIV Prevalence with HIV Prevalence Among FSW in the Caribbean

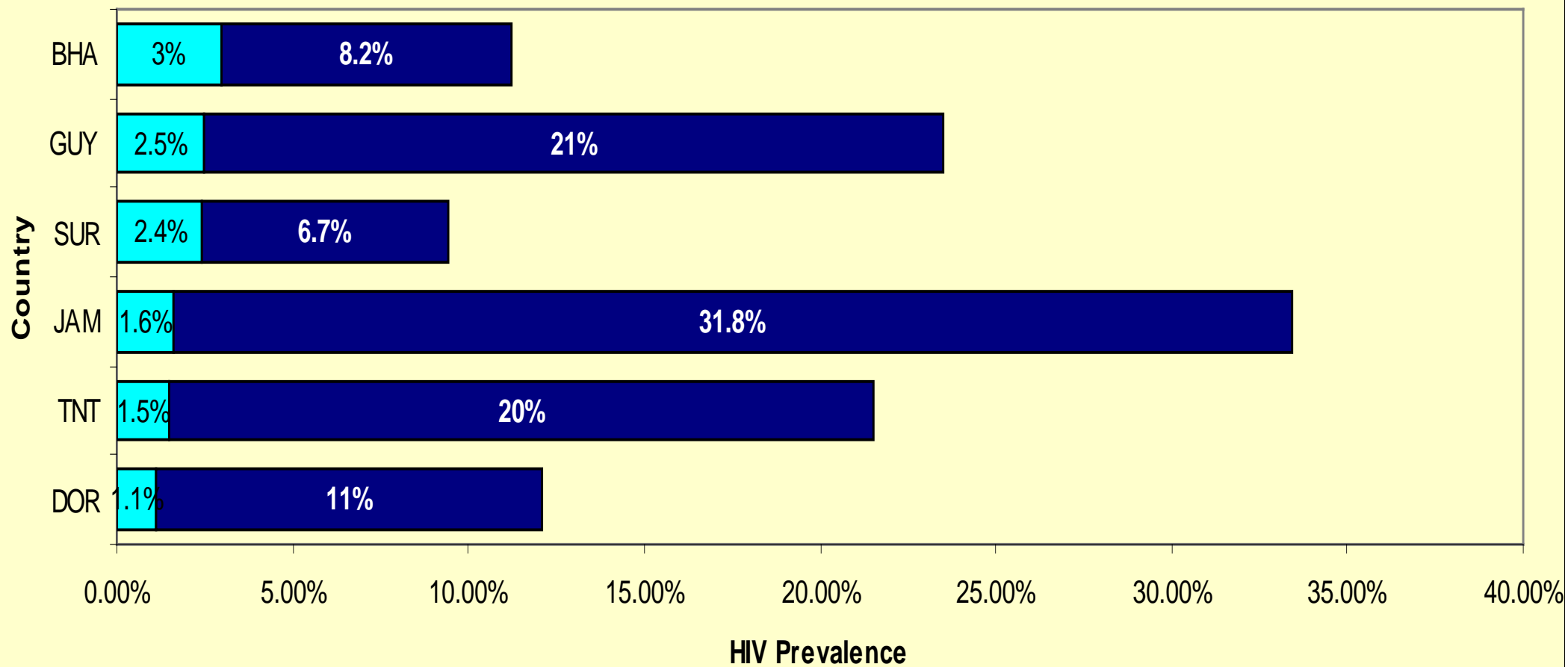

Comparing Adult HIV Prevalence and HIV Prevalence Among Caribbean MSM 2005-2007

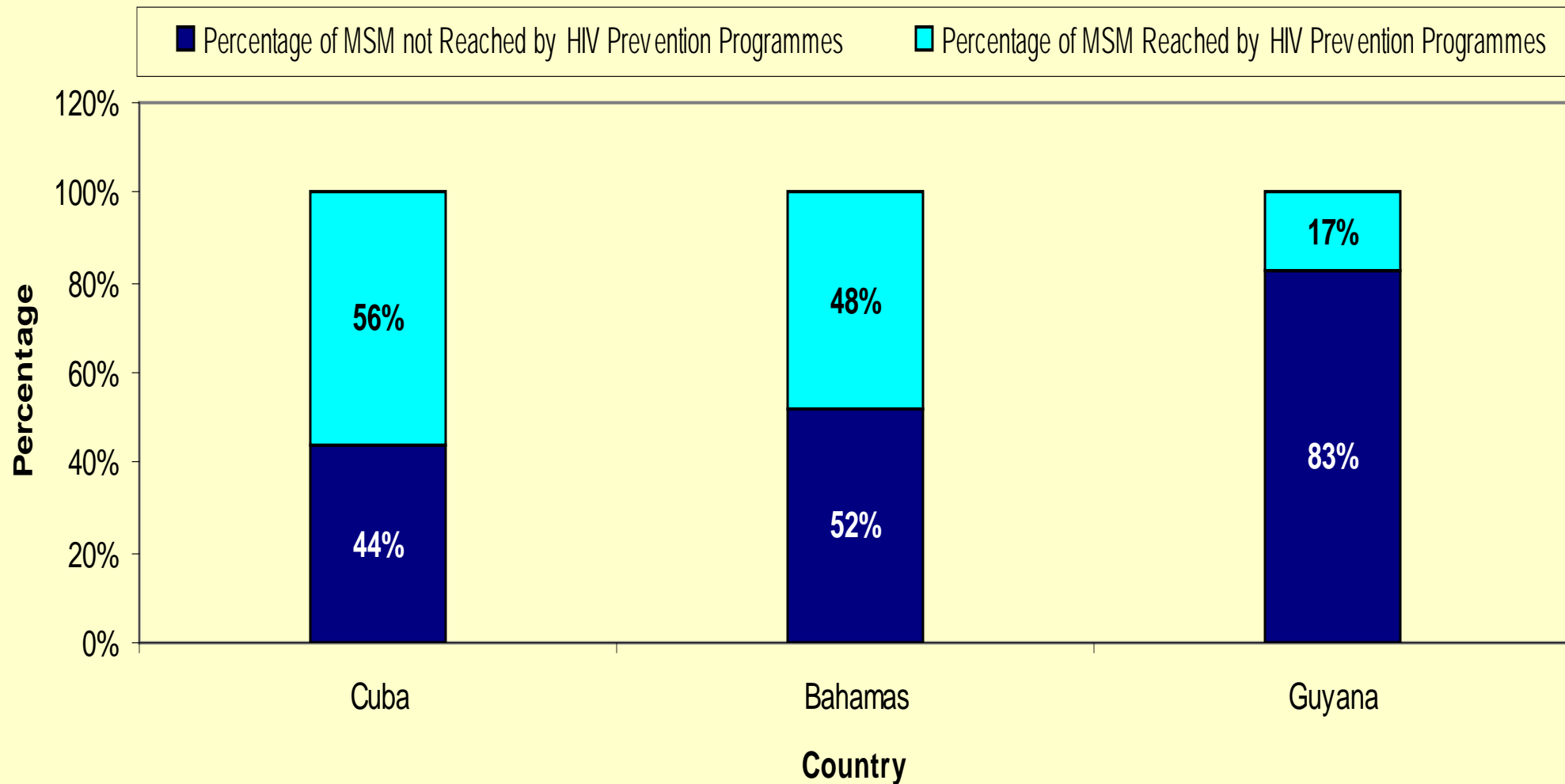
■ Adult HIV Prevalence Rate in 2007

Percentage of MSM Reached and Not Reached by HIV Prevention Programmes in Three Caribbean Countries. UNAIDS/WHO. 2008



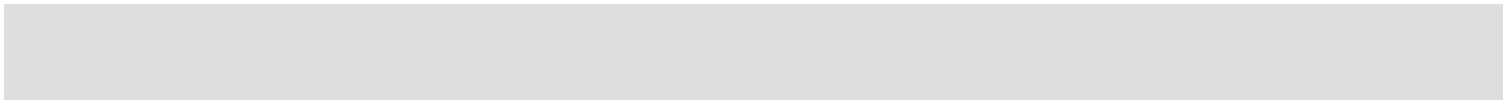
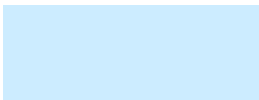
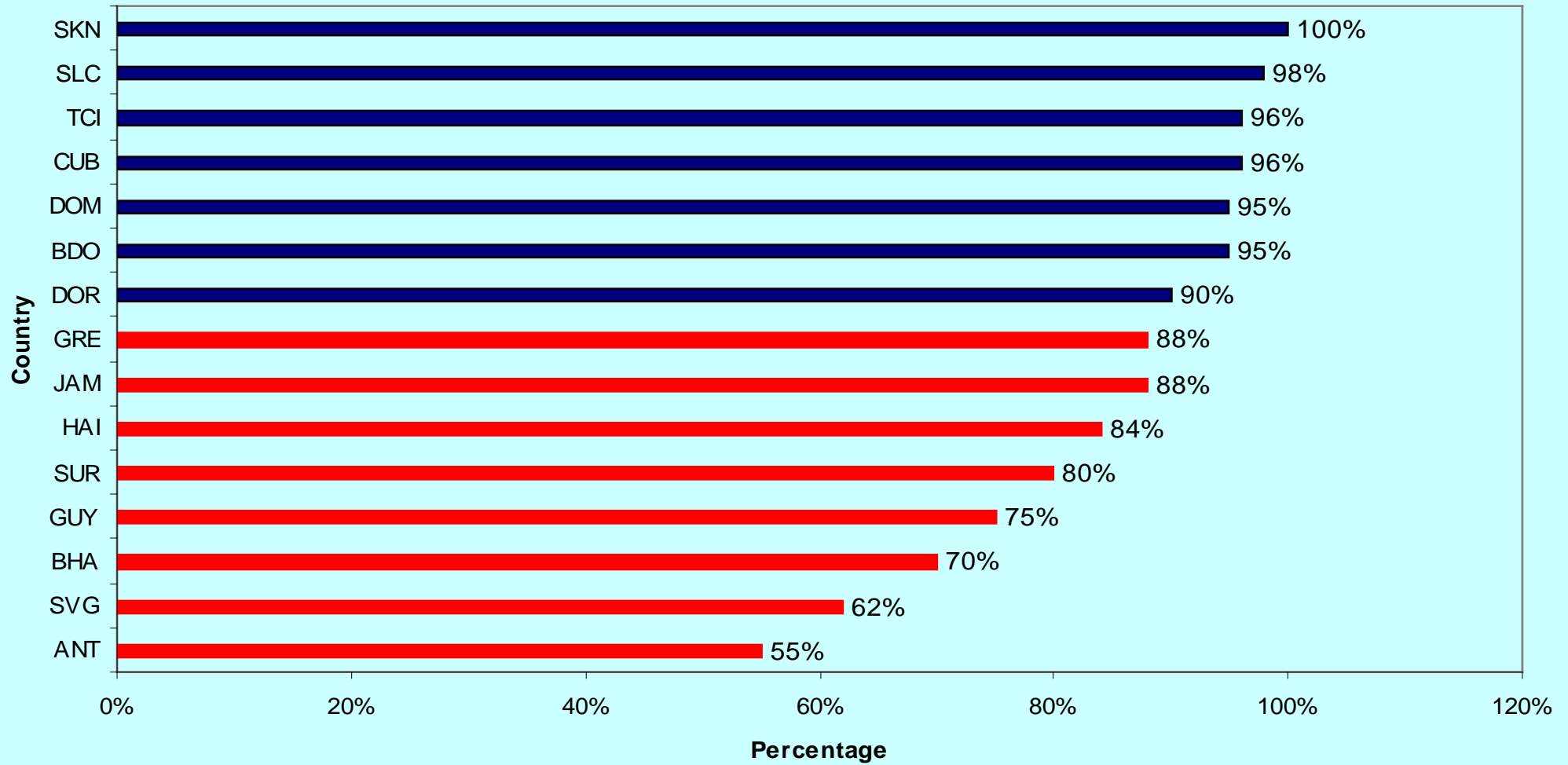

Conclusions

- Regional response rate was higher than the Global rate
- Relative to all reporting countries, the Caribbean countries' reports were:
 - Timely and reporting well on indicators re health sector
 - Lacking data on Orphans and Vulnerable Children (OVCs)
 - Lacking data on Vulnerable Groups such as MSM and CSW and
 - Vulnerable Groups have limited access to prevention programmes despite their high level of HIV infections
